WORK IN PROGRESS

501.0.03 Kara Braithwaite-Westoby sends the following report on her recent PhD thesis entitled *Epameinondas the Great* (2020, University of Otago NZ, xi&402pp. <http://hdl.handle.net/10523/10030>). See 501.1.01.

Epameinondas the Theban (*c.* 418/412–362 BCE) may very well be the most pre-eminent figure in all of Boeotian history, yet he has not been afforded a dedicated monograph for over 60 years (M. Fortina, *Epaminondas*. Torino: Società editrice internazionale, 1958); nor, to date, has there ever been one in English. This thesis endeavours to remedy the situation, while incorporating much of the vast corpus of relevant scholarly works published in recent decades. After investigating the ancient literature in the opening chapters, the work largely concerns itself with the Theban general, focusing predominantly on political and military matters. Throughout, a number of specific issues are dealt with, such as Epameinondas' alleged involvement at the siege of Mantinea (*c.* 386–385), a discussion of the novelty of the tactics used at the Battle of Leuctra (371), and a reassessment of the evidence for the second Theban-led invasion of the Peloponnese (369). Perhaps most outstanding is the lengthy chapter on Epameinondas' naval expedition (*c.* 364), our knowledge of which has improved due to a number of recent articles and epigraphical finds. This chapter attempts to be all-encompassing, devoting much discussion to the logistics of the expedition and the potential naval bases used. Finally, to complete the history of the general, an appendix is included, which offers an assessment of the reception of Epameinondas from his death to the modern day. Here, the focus is on the various artworks and literature in which he appears, with particular attention being given to works from the Renaissance and the Enlightenment, when he was considered to be one of the greatest of all ancient figures.

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
