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Obituaries

Readers of *Teiresias* will be saddened to learn of the recent death of two esteemed colleagues.

Gilbert Argoud (9.6.1937 - 20.4.2011)

Gilbert Argoud, Commandeur dans l'Ordre des Palmes Académiques, Chevalier de la Légion d'Honneur, who died on the 20th of April after a long illness, was, until his retirement in 1996, a member of the Faculté des lettres at the Université de Saint Étienne. He rose through the ranks from 1969 to be Professeur des Universités, and from 1980 to 1983 and again from 1986 until his retirement in 1996, was Dean of the Faculté des lettres. He was also, from 1989 to 2000, Directeur du Centre Jean-Palerne, Centre de Recherche de l'Université de Saint-Étienne rattaché au CNRS, of which he had been a member since its creation in 1972.

Following his retirement, upon which he was named Professeur Emérite, Gilbert Argoud was engaged in municipal politics, where he served first as a councillor, and for seven years, from 2001 to 2008, as Premier adjoint de la Ville de Saint-Étienne.

He received his Doctorat d'État in 1986, for a thesis entitled "L'eau et son utilisation urbaine et rurale en Grèce du VI^e siècle au Ier siècle avant J-C". This interest in ancient Greek hydraulics pervades much of his work, and is the subject of numerous publications, but his close friendship with Paul Roesch brought him into the field of Boiotian studies as well.

In 1983, together with Paul Roesch, Gilbert Argoud organized the international colloquium "La Béotie antique", the proceedings of which were published in 1985. Gilbert was one of the team of three who prepared for publication the late Paul Roesch's *Les Inscriptions de Thespies*.

Gilbert Argoud was a man of many parts, a highly respected scholar and administrator, and a person of great charm withal. He will be missed not only by his family (his wife Claude, their children and grand-children), but by all those who knew him.

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John Buckler (16.3.1945 - 2.6.2011)

The death on the 2nd of June, after a short illness, of John Buckler, Emeritus Professor of Greek History, deprived the scholarly world of one of its leading authorities on the history of Central Greece in the fourth century BC. His doctoral dissertation, written at Harvard under the direction of Ernst Badian (whose death earlier this year John felt keenly), resulted in his first major publication, *The Theban Hegemony, 371-362 BC* (1980). This was followed in 1989 by *Philip II and the Sacred War*. Both these works remain the standard texts on their subjects. In 2008, together with Hans Beck, John Buckler published a collection of his major articles, *Central Greece and the Politics of Power in the Fourth Century BC*. At the time of his death, he was working on a book on the logistics of Greek warfare, of which he had completed the first half. Throughout his career and up to the end of his life, he published numerous articles, both in journals and scholarly works of reference, including contributions to *Brill's New Jacoby*.

John was a stellar attraction at many conferences on Boiotian antiquities. One of these he organized in 1985 with Hartmut Beister in Munich, at the end of a two-year tenure of an Alexander von Humboldt Fellowship at the Institut für Alte Geschichte. The proceedings of this conference were published in 1989 under the title *Boiotika*.

John Buckler was, among other things, a brilliant military historian, whose written work was based on a close familiarity, not only with the relevant sources, but also with the terrain on which the principal battles of the period were fought. As a result, his descriptions of these engagements are both vivid and clear.

John was generous with his time and counsel, and a model of academic rectitude. He is survived -- and sorely missed -- by his wife Caroline, his two step-daughters, and numerous friends and colleagues.

The Epigraphy and History of Boeotia: New Finds, New Developments

The *Sara B. Aleshire Center for the Study of Greek Epigraphy* in collaboration with the Department of Classics of the University of California at Berkeley is organizing a Symposium entitled 'The Epigraphy and History of Boeotia: New Finds, New Developments'. The Symposium, which is also supported financially by the *Doreen B. Townsend Center for the Humanities*, will take place at Berkeley in early September 2011 (September 1-3). Scholars from all over the world will present new inscriptions or old documents that have been overlooked, and will discuss recent developments in the study of Boeotian History, primarily in the light of epigraphical and other archaeological discoveries.
